4. Review of Term 1 Lexia Student Data

Daphne presented to the committee the Lexia results for term one. The program is utilized in classrooms from Kindergarten to Grade 8. When it's taught the right way, literacy is fully within reach of the vast majority of learners - both students and teachers. Across all solutions and services, Lexia's approach is focused on sound methodology, engaging experiences, and continued acknowledgement of the value of each individual learner. By doing so, we're making literacy truly accessible for everyone we support. The digital presentation can be found on pages 7-19 of the minutes.

5. One School's Story: Supporting Students Using Lexia and IXL – Presentation by Matt Cull, Sacred Heart Kirkland Lake

During the meeting, Matt Cull discussed what he and his staff were doing to actively engage students in the use of their programs; IXL and Lexia.

Matt shared that his EAs were all able to access the Lexia and IXL platforms. From here, they could see daily which students were struggling and needed support. They could then provide timely and purposeful instruction that was directed to a particular student or a small group of students. This was done on a daily basis. This allowed students to progress much quicker, leaving them with a sense of accomplishment. Not only was the school closing gaps at a fantastic rate but the EAs were engaged and felt a sense of ownership and responsibility in the education of the children. It was also noted that student behaviour was decreased, and engagement was increased when students were working with the EAs. Furthermore, there has been a slight but steady increase in the amount of time students are using Lexia and IXL at home.

6. Learning Recovery Plans

6.1 Tutors in the Classroom

The Ministry of Education has provided our board with money to offer tutoring to our students from K to grade 8. The postings are being released shortly with the goal of hiring two tutors per elementary school for the months of May and June.

6.2 OFIP Tutoring

As we have for many years, we will be offering OFIP tutoring to support the preparation of grade 3 & 6 students for EQAO. Each elementary school has been allotted 10-15 hours of tutoring by a qualified teacher. This tutoring is to take place between mid-April and the end of May.

6.3 Summer Learning/Transition Program

We are in the preliminary planning stages for our summer learning and transition programs. We also have funds through our After School Skills Development Program for students with Autism to support the August program. We have not yet confirmation that we will have CODE funding for our July Summer Learning program. This will be offered in person where there is sufficient enrolment. Our greatest challenge will be to find staff who are willing to work the month of July. The After School Skill Development Program will begin mid-April in six of our schools and being offered for the first time at O'Gorman High School. The program will run for 10 weeks in elementary schools and 9 weeks at O'Gorman High School. The program is designed for students with Autism and is open to all students who may have a similar approach to learning.

7. Enrolment for September 2023

We currently have 115 students who have registered for Year 1 Kindergarten. A Welcome to Kindergarten program will be running for 6 Saturdays beginning in May. The session is 2 hours every Saturday and open to all Kindergarten registered for August 2023. The program will have a Teacher, ECE and supervising Principal to oversee the sessions.

8. October 31st Data

Special Education data is completed twice a year; the end of October and March however with the move to PowerSchool there has been delays in obtaining this data for the last 2 years. Daphne presented to the data to the committee and advised that the data is not 100% accurate as there are still a large number of students that need to have assessments completed. Page 6 of the minutes show a complete list of the data reviewed.

9. Agency Reports

North Eastern Ontario Family and Children's Services

NEOFACS has adopted a new approach in regards to protection. Signs of Safety: A New Practice Framework For our Child Welfare Services

Signs of Safety[®] is a new way of working with families when concerns about a child's safety or well-being are brought to the attention of North Eastern Ontario Family and Children's Services (NEOFACS).

In September 2020, NEOFACS decided to move forward with adopting the Signs of Safety approach as its practice framework for all child welfare services.

We have a multi-year transformation plan designed to embed Signs of Safety. Staff are currently participating in learning modules to increase their knowledge of the approach and put it into practice.

Our Signs of Safety implementation journey will fundamentally change how our child welfare services will work with children, youth and families.

Mental Health Week - Annually, Mental Health Week is acknowledged during the first week of May with an emphasis on children's mental health. Recognizing Children's Mental Health Week is more important than ever!

Children's Mental Health Week (CMHW) is an opportunity to raise awareness about child and youth mental health and remind families of services available in our community. North Eastern Ontario Family and Children's Services (NEOFACS) is here to help children, youth, and their families struggling with mental health.

Here are services you can expect in the Districts of Cochrane and Timiskaming:

- NEOFACS provides wraparound services for children, youth and their families with <u>a wide range of supports</u>. Here, children, youth and their families can access the experts your child or youth may need, which may include: child and youth workers, social workers, psychotherapists, psychologists and psychiatrists. Our services are free of charge.
- By contacting NEOFACS, families can quickly access a single session with a child and youth mental health worker.
- We also offer crisis services where you can expect 24/7 crisis support services for child and youth mental health.

Bursary Awards Program

Through the Bursary Awards Program, the <u>North Eastern Ontario Children's Foundation</u> awards bursaries and endowments to deserving youth that are currently receiving or have previously received services from North Eastern Ontario Family and Children's Services.

The program provides much-deserved recognition, fosters confidence, and assists youth in pursuing their goals, in most cases, through post-secondary education or training.

This year, the newly created Human Services Community Bursary was added to the Bursary Awards Program and is open to the general public. This bursary offers educational support to youth from Cochrane-Timiskaming who are pursuing post-secondary education in the human services field. 

What is Lexia?

Lexia is a digital platform that focuses on developing a wide range of literacy skills for learners from FDK to Grade 8. It is divided into two programs - Core 5 for FDK to Grade 5 and PowerUp for Grade 6-8.

These programs are built upon the science of reading and structured literacy, delivering the systematic and explicit instruction learners need to truly comprehend, retain, and apply literacy foundations.



Implementation at the NCDSB



2020-2021

Introduction of Lexia to all students in FDK to Grade 8. Focus was on students using the program daily for the recommended time by grade.



2021-2022

Focus on developing teacher understanding of the tools available in the program to support teaching.



2022-2023

Focus on using support staff more strategically to support student learning using Lexia.



2023-2024

Renew all licenses for Core5 FDK to Grade 5; Purchase licenses for PowerUp for students working at the foundational level.






