The Importance of HOPE:

Hope is the theological virtue by which we desire the kingdom of heaven and eternal life. We are at our happiest when we place our trust in Christ’s promises and rely not only on our strength, but on the help of the grace from the Holy Spirit. Hope is God’s gift to us at Baptism and unites us with the risen Christ. Hopeful people work for peace and justice on earth despite facing many obstacle. They trust that God’s plan will be fulfilled, even if not in their lifetime.



Hope is visible in our classrooms whenever we find prayer, trust in God’s faithfulness and work for justice and peace. It is hope above all that gives us strength to live and to continually try new things even in conditions that may seem hopeless. “Life is too precious to permit its devaluation by living pointlessly, emptily, without meaning, love and finally without hope” Vaclav Havel

Feels Like: Feeling like I belong, warm sunshine on my face, knowing God loves me, knowing someone cares about me, petting my cat or dog, a hug when I have not seen someone in a while, a quiet mind.

PRAYER CENTRE IDEAS FOR HOPE



Lamb– To symbolize that Jesus is the sacrificial Lamb of God who died for us.

Butterfly – *The butterfly, with the power of flight, emerges from a lifeless cocoon in the spring. The butterfly is a symbol of the resurrection, and therefore joy.*

Egg – *The egg is a symbol of birth and rebirth. It is therefore a symbol of Christ's resurrection and is seen at Easter.*

Three crosses – *To symbolize the three crosses on Calvary.*

Empty Tomb – *To symbolize the tomb where Jesus was laid.*

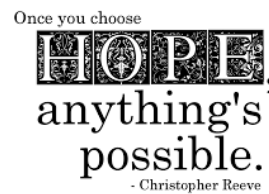

Bulletin Board Ideas:

Tree of Joy

What makes you feel joyful? Have students write what makes them feel joyful and write on a heart. Hang the hearts on a tree

From Darkness to Light:

Cut out paper branches. Have paper branches run down the hallway, towards the bulletin board. During Lent, the students could add leaves, fruit and flowers to it. This gives the children the visual that out of the darkness comes life and growth.

Growth & Change “New Life”:

Place a tree with many branches on a bulletin board. In class, the children then decorate wooden clothespins with markers and glued on googly eyes to represent caterpillars. Next, tie-dye coffee filters with ink and water and glue to the clothespin. Add pipe cleaner antennae. When completely dry, wrap in brown tissue paper and secure to the branches. After Easter, open the tissue paper, unroll the wings of the butterflies and attach to the tree. They give the children the visual that Lent is a time for growth and change.

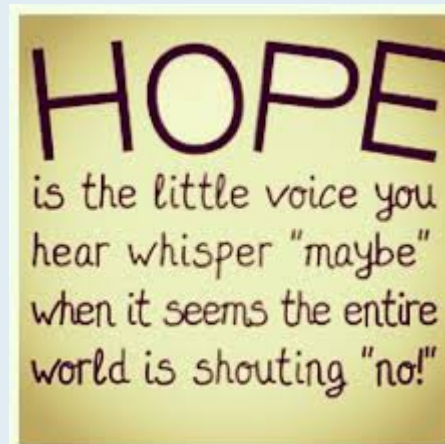
