
2012 PINK SHIRT DAY

DRESSING FOR THE WEATHER



We are well into winter—and though it has been a mild one, we still have many students who are not coming to school dressed appropriately. All students are required to go outside for each recess, whether or not they are dressed properly. Please ensure your child has a hat and mitts, a warm coat and ski pants. Students are always encouraged to wear the items they come to school with for each recess. Many are choosing not to wear some of their clothing at recess and are then asking to come in to get it. We will not be allowing them to do this after today. They are aware of the expectations and will be expected to dress properly before they go out. We always have extra mitts here at school should someone need a pair.

CONFLICT VERSUS BULLYING

Bullying is a relationship issue

- Bullying is **INTENTIONALLY HURTFUL** behavior that happens **REPEATEDLY**.
- It's about using **POWER** in an aggressive way to hurt others.
- It can be physical, verbal, relational, exclusionary and done electronically (Cyber-bullying).

Bullying is **NOT**....

- A conflict between friends
- An argument between people of equal power
- Accidental
- A one-time event

I'm very pleased to be able to share with you that we have dealt with very few confirmed cases of bullying this year. Most often, situations are a result of conflicts between students that are easily solved and dealt with through mediation and discussion. Nonetheless, parents and students are encouraged to report **ANY** behavior that appears as though it might be bullying. Incidents of bullying will **NOT** be tolerated and are dealt with swiftly.

CELEBRATING OUR FAITH: FORTITUDE



Fortitude is one of the four cardinal virtues. It is commonly called *courage*; however, it is different from what we often think of. The cardinal virtue of fortitude involves practicing what is good and just when it is difficult or even dangerous. A person of fortitude practices patience when meeting obstacles. They do what is right, even when others criticize them. Fortitude allows us to overcome our fear and remain resilient in the face of obstacles. Prudence and justice are the virtues through which we decide what needs to be done; fortitude gives us the strength to do it.

Fortitude is visible in our Catholic schools when we witness people defending truth and kindness especially during challenging situations. Students who do not cheat when the opportunity presents itself, who are capable of saying no to their friends who pressure them and students who stand up for others and do not participate in teasing or bullying are students who are displaying the virtue of fortitude.
