#### BILL 157 - KEEPING OUR KIDS SAFE AT SCHOOL

#### The Do's & Don'ts

#### of Read-Aloud

- Begin reading to your child as soon as possible. The younger you start, the easier and better it is.
- Read as often as you and the child have time for. Try to read a minimum of 15 minutes per day.
- Encourage involvement in the reading by having the child turn pages, chime in known words, or predict what might happen next.
- Occasionally read above the child's intellectual level and challenge his/her mind.
- Use plenty of expression when reading. Practice makes perfect.
- Don't read too fast. Read slowly enough for the child to build mental pictures of what has just been read.
- Don't read stories you don't enjoy yourself. Your dislike will show in the reading, defeating the purpose.
- Don't use the book as a threat "If you don't clean your room, no book tonight!"
- Don't give your child a choice between a story and watching T.V.
