Reading Ideas for Home

Read to Me

Read to me riddles and read to me rhymes
Read to me stories of magical times
Read to me tales about castles and kings
Read to me stories of fabulous things
Read to me pirates and read to me knights
Read to me dragons and dragon-book fights
Read to me spaceships and cowboys and then
When you are finished, please read them again.

- Set a good example as a reader—let kids see you reading every day.
- Get a subscription in his/her name to an age-appropriate magazine for your child. When a relative asks for gift ideas suggest this.
- Visit the library often and keep lots of books, magazines and newspapers around the house.
- Don't fret if "Captain Underpants" has captivated your child rather than "Robinson Crusoe". The important thing is that he/she is reading!
- Make reading a fun time—a time that you and your child look forward to spending together.

Things to ask your child about what he/she has read:

- Ask your child to compare a book to another familiar book. How are the characters alike or different? Do the stories take place in similar settings?
- Ask what part of the story or book your child liked best and why.
- Ask if your child liked the ending to the story. Why or why not?
- Ask your child what type of mood the story or chapter in a book creates. Ask how the author creates the mood. For example, does she use certain words, events or settings that create a particular feeling?

Things to Keep in Mind

Homework Tips for students:

First, be sure you understand the assignment. Write it down in your notebook or day planner if you need to, and don't be afraid to ask questions about what's expected. It's much easier to ask the teacher during or after class than to struggle to remember later that night!

Supervision:

Parents please do not drop your children off before 8:35 in the morning

Students going home for lunch should return no earlier than 12:40.

Tips Con't:

Be sure to put your homework safely away in your backpack—there's nothing worse than having a completed assignment that you can't find the next morning or that gets ruined by a careless brother or sister. (And no teacher still believes that "eaten by the dog" line—even when it's true!)

Lunch:

Eating lunch at school is a privilege. Should your child choose not to follow the school rules for lunchtime, he/she will have that privilege removed. Many other problem solving attempts will be made and parental contact will occur before the final consequence of no longer being allowed to eat lunch at school.
