Our virtue for December is: Justice.

The need to do justice stems from our obligation to respect the dignity of every human person. This dignity comes from being created in God's image. FOCUS ON INSTRUCTION

I Can Read with My Eyes Shut!

Help your child "read with understanding" by trying out some of the following strategies:

- ⇒ **Asking questions** (i.e. What might happen next? Does this make sense? Why did this happen?) This helps them make connections between parts of a story.
- ⇒ Inferring or "reading between the lines." Children need to use information from both the story and their own knowledge and experience to find meaning that is not directly stated. They must find evidence in the text to justify their thinking (ie. Mary was sad because on pg. 2 it said she was crying).

- ⇒ **Summarizing** helps children sequence a story and talk about the most important points. Have them talk about what happens on each page (Primary) or in each chapter (Junior).
- ⇒ Figuring out difficult words using many strategies (not just trying to sound out phonetically as many of us learned to do). Some of these include:
- Cooking at the pictures
- Breaking the word into smaller parts
- © Reading on to the end of the sentence and seeing what makes sense, then
- Cooking at the beginning sound and seeing what word makes sense in the sentence.
- © Checking what looks and sounds right and checking if it makes sense.
- © Does it look like another word they know? If you can read **cat**, then you can read **bat**.
- © After trying several strategies that they know, they can ask a friend, brother/sister or an adult.
- © Once they have read a word they struggled with go back to it in the same story, or other stories and practice reading it reminding them "you know this!"

As they build confidence in their use of strategies, you will see their reading improve in leaps and bounds!
