

Reporting an Absent Student

If your child is going to be absent for the day, or a portion of the day, please be sure to call the school by 9:00 am. Mrs. Cheff is required to call the parents of all absent students. A BIG thanks to those parents who do call as this saves a great deal of time for all of us!

Supervision on the Playground

Please be advised that our playground is <u>unsupervised before 8:30.</u>

therefore, children are not to be dropped off at school before this time. For those children who walk to school, parents need to time their arrival so that they are not here before 8:30. At the end of the school day, all children who walk are asked to go directly home.

Changes to Transportation <u>Arrangements</u>

If you will be picking your child up from school instead of having him/ her take the bus, please call the school by 2:30 to let us know. We are required to log how each child gets home on a daily basis. Last minute changes make this process difficult.

Emergency Preparedness Plan

We are required by law to have 6 fire drills and 2 lockdown drills each year. Students are taught how to respond during these drills before any take place. Though this can seem scary to some of our children, it is a necessary part of school operations.



Visitors to the School

Although we always welcome parents to the school, we do have a visitor's policy in effect. You must sign in at the front office and get a visitor's pass if you wish to proceed into any area of the school that has classrooms. We thank you in advance for your cooperation with this process.

Pick Up & Drop Off

As you all know, parking is at a premium in the area around the school. Parking becomes a serious safety concern at arrival and dismissal times. We are asking all parents to avoid parking in the turn around area in front of the school before and after school. The area designated as 5 minute parking does not apply to these times and are off limits.

Buses are struggling to get through and the number of vehicles using the turn around is making it dangerous out there for our children.

The Northeastern Catholic District School Board is committed to providing access to the latest technology in its' schools. At St. Paul School, we are proud to offer a wireless environment that allows staff and students to use a variety of technology to enhance teaching practice and student engagement. Most of our classrooms have SmartBoards which allow students and teachers to work with technology in very interactive and effective ways. We are also excited to have access to more than 4 dozen laptops and more than 2 dozen iPads that can be used in classrooms as needed. However, with this exciting new technology comes certain responsibilities on the part of the student.

Every student at St. Paul School is expected to be familiar with the Acceptable Use of Technology policy and to follow the expectations found within this document. Any student who chooses not to meet these expectations will have their computer privileges revoked.

It is also important to remind parents and students that the Safe Schools

Act now provides school principals with the authority to suspend from school any student who engages in cyber bullying. Acts of cyber bullying do not peed to bappen at school, parents and students are

cyber bullying. Acts of cyber bullying do not need to happen at school—parents and students are encouraged to report incidents of cyber bullying that take place on social networking sites (i.e Facebook), in email or a chat pod—even if it is happening after school hours.
